## Hamlet of Nora

**Nora** is a quiet hamlet nestled in east-central Saskatchewan, steeped in prairie heritage and railway history. Though small today, Nora once played a vital role in regional settlement and agriculture.

## **Historical Overview**

- The **Nora Post Office** began operating in **1915**, serving settlers before the townsite was officially established
- In **1924**, the **Canadian Pacific Railway** extended its line through the area, prompting rapid growth
- The hamlet soon featured a general store, hardware shop, cafe, school, blacksmith shop, and grain elevators

## **Agricultural Legacy**

- Nora was home to **two grain elevators**:
  - o The first was built in **1924** by the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, later operated by the Saskatchewan Wheat Pool
  - A second elevator, built by Searle Grain Company in 1933, remained in service until its removal in 1984
